

FROM THE EDITORS:

The Pima Canyon Trailhead has been rerouted. It looks like we can expect development from the Magee Road alignment, north to the forest boundary. The trail still leaves the parking lot at the water fountain, but immediately turns to the right in front of the Tom Bingham memorial. The trail remains between two fences that head east, to the south of the old trail, and north of Pima Wash. Then the trail turns up a ridge, joining the old trail about 100 yards before the forest boundary fence.

The trail is more narrow, with cactus planted close to the trail. It tends to wander a bit more, but should be passable by stokes. People will not like assisting along the sides of the stokes, though.

Of more concern is the absence of a gate suitable for horses. Access to the old horse gate has been blocked by one of the new fences. We understand that the Pima Trails people are working on the problem, so we shall see. Otherwise, to get to the Pima Canyon Trail, horses will need to start from the north end of Skyline, requiring knowledge of the trail that wanders northeast to the old road. A second option is the old road from Ina and Pima Canyon Road (the short road connecting Ina to Skyline), but there is some construction along that road, south of the old farmhouse, perhaps an access gate.



CALLOUT REVIEWS

Summary of Data

Reporting Period: 26 Apr - 03 June 96 Callouts: 4

THU 9 MAY: CALL 96.036 Rescue of a climber 200 feet above the roadway at milepost 4 on the Catalina Highway. This rescue was initially reported as a car over the side. The climber a suffered a open lower tib-fib fracture, while descending a gully after a climb. He was placed in a stokes basket and lowered down the slope to the roadway.

THU 16 MAY: CALL 96.037 Body Recovery 300 feet below the Alder Box Pullout at milepost 23 on the Catalina Highway. The suicide victim was discovered by a Mt.Lemmon deputy who was checking a car that had been seen parked for several days. He was walking out to a rock outcropping on a ridge, thinking of checking the base of the cliff, but discovered the body of a large individual on a slope. Few people responded to the initial page, thus a second page requested additional help. A haul system brought the body up to the roadway.

15 people, 59 hours

SUN 02 JUN: CALL 96.038 A 3 year old boy was reported missing from a residence near Sabino Canyon Rd and Tanque Verde Wash. His father put him down on a couch for a nap about noon, then laid down in another room. When he awoke and checked the boy, only his clothes were on the couch. Mom could not be found after she got off work, so it was not known if she had the boy, and had not mentioned any plans for the afternoon. SAV people covered the neighborhood, and SRDI team looked around closer to the house, with lots of local residents out looking as well. Nothing found at all. A few hours later, mom showed up with the boy. Standby only. 5 people, 10 hours SAV

SUN 02 JUN: CALL 96.039 A 57 year old male was reported overdue from a hike in Sabino Canyon. His wife last saw him at home just after noon, and he was due back for evening plans. She located his car at the Visitor's Center, and reported him overdue. No information about intended route was available, so everything needed to be covered. Search teams were in the field for awhile, when voice contact was made from the PhoneLine Link Trail, which climbs from Tram Stop 1 to the PhoneLine Trail. The subject had been on the PhoneLine Trail, took off his fanny pack and hat at a rest stop, then fell off the trail and tumbled about 150 feet, then waited for assistance. He was showing stroke symptoms, and had injured an ankle. A second page requested additional help for the rescue. He was treated, packaged, hauled to the trail above, and carried to Lower Sabino. At TMC, a previously undiagnosed brain tumor was discovered. ?? people, ?? hours

And now a letter from Walter Pickett, an active SARA member till he went looking for adventure with Uncle Sam

(Dear Loma)

Greetings from the Land Of Morning Calm, that's if you are not driving in Seoul. I have never seen traffic this bad. There are few rules of the road. The first one is that red-light means YIELD. The second is that who ever have the bigger vehicle has the right of way. The only thing that seems sacred is the crosswalk. They always yield to pedestrians in the crosswalk because if you don't and hit them, you wind up paying not only for the medical but you pay them for the rest of their lives. It's almost as if you have bought them. Parking is a trip as well. I've seen Koreans park *in mass* on the off ramp of the highway for a festival in Seoul as well as parking on the sidewalk.

I've been here two weeks now. I've already tried kimchi, which is fermented cabbage or other vegetables with peppers. It's pretty spicy as well as kind of sick smelling the first time. It's not too bad except it's usually served cold. I'd like it served hot but what the heck, I'm just an American.

My job here is great so far. I'm working at a Health Clinic in Yongsan which is a suburb of Seoul. I'm working in the treatment room with the doctors and no RNs (Yea Hallelujah). What I mean so far is that when I got to this unit, I was told I would be going to Camp Page which is north and east of Seoul & be in charge of the treatment room. However, I been told since I'm doing such a good job here (and the guy who is in charge of the treatment room here is doing such a bad job) I may be staying here in Yongsan. Oh well, I guess I'll hold out for the highest bidder like the pro athletes do! (NOT!!!)

I've already been out hiking (last Saturday) to a high hillside called Dorduramsan. It's only about 500 feet high. The interesting part is that the Koreans who guided us could not rate the hike except to say that we need "a rope for a small part" that was cool with me. However it was raining lightly & almost all of the Americans on this hike were not equipped for the rain & almost knew nothing about climbing or rope handling. Imagine yourself trying to rock scramble (on solid rock) in a light rain with one hand holding an umbrella! The first thing that is different from American trail building vs. Korean trail building is that the Koreans either don't know what switchbacks are or just don't care. This trail went straight up the hill. It was very well used with trail tape marking the route as well as litter here & there. The Koreans don't believe in or don't know about water bars either. We got to the part that needed a rope which was about a ten to fifteen foot drop (with lots of hand and foot holds) everyone needed a LOT of coaching & direction. When I got to it, I just did a normal Duffersitz & had no problems. The Tour Guide-in-charge was semi impressed. The Americans thought I was crazy. Oh Well, Life Is Hard.

The only hard and difficult part of this tour is not the language but the time difference. We not are in a different time zone from you, we are in a different <u>day zone</u>. You guys watch the NBA playoffs at night on a Wednesday night, while we see them on Thursday morning & afternoon. Anyway, I have to go. Take Care & God Bless You All.




