SEARCH AND RESCUE COUNCIL

DIGITAL PAGER CODES

The digital pager codes indicate the <u>People Needed</u> for a callout. They are NOT meant to be the <u>Type Of Call</u>. So: 222 is requesting Search People (and search support people), 555 requests K-9 People (and K-9's, and K-9 support people), and 555 222 (or 222 555) requests both of the above.

Some people have been letting themselves become confused, thinking the codes refer to the type of call. Some strange interpretations have been the result!

K-9 people are considered to be search people, but if they want to wait for a call that specifically requests them, that's their choice. If we can know in advance that K-9's are specifically requested, we're way ahead of what little info we usually get. We frequently miss having any K-9's on a call. The initial stages of a search could usually use a K-9 team to help sort out Direction-of-Travel, and possibly eliminate parts of the search area (the Boy Scouts, the Texas family, the Tohono girl, need I go on?). If the team is available for a longer assignment, that's even better.

Posse people are capable of being Search, Rescue or support, and we usually don't know whether there will be assignments for people ahoof, or just those aboot. Looks like they are just like everyone else, they gotta show up and find out what's going on.

CALLOUT REVIEWS

Summary of Data

SAT 29 JUN: CALL 96.046 Report of children in flooded wash. Reportee stated there were children NEAR a flooded wash, and the report was misinterpreted. Rendezvous only.

WED 3 JUL: CALL 96.047 Search for a 21 year old male in Gates Pass, Tucson Mountains. The subject was hiking with a friend Monday evening, taking pictures of the sunset. He got hot and decided to find some shade while his friend continued hiking. The friend never saw the subject again and thought that he had hiked out. Searchers started searching Wednesday morning, and the subject's body was found 300 yards from the parking lot.

15 people, 46 hours

SAT 6 JUL: CALL 96.048 Report of exhausted hiker on Butterfly Trail. She got out on her own. Rendezvous only. MLFD TUE 9 JUL: CALL 96.049 Family of four overdue from hike on Mt.Lemmon. Their vehicle was located at SkiValley. Our few teams covered trails north and south of the vehicle. The Forest Service was notified, alerting a couple of crews doing fire duty and trail maintenance. The family was from Texas, and not familiar with the mountain, but their map was left in their vehicle. They wound up close to Romero Pass, got dumped on by a thundershower, and met the trail crew at the spring house near the Lemmon Rock junction. 21 people, 106 hours USFS

SUN 14 JUL: CALL 96.050 Swift water rescue of a pickup stranded in the wash on the Bar X Ranch Road, west of Catalina. A pickup with two individuals attempted to cross the wash with water running in it. The truck became stranded and the people began yelling for help. Golder Ranch responded along with Ranger 38. Ranger was able to land on the far bank and was able to coax one of the individual to shore. A SAR team waded out to the pickup thru calf-deep water and escorted the other individual to the other shore. 19 people, 19 hours GRFD R38

TUE 16 JUL, WED 17 JUL: CALL 96.051, 052 Search for a 7 year old female near Cowlic, southwest of Sells. The subject was last seen around her residence, accompanied by her two dogs. Teams found tracks near the water catchment behind the residence. Wild Land Fire Fighters, Marines, Border Patrol trackers, and several helicopters helped in the search. Eventually the girl walked into a village 7 miles southwest of the residence. She was barefoot during her walk but had no bruises, blisters, or cuts. She was in good shape considering how far she had walked.

21 people, 183 hours, Sells PD, TOFD, Customs, R38, USMC, Wild Land Firefighters

WED 24 JUL: CALL 96.053 A 16 year old male was playing atop the practice cliff next to the Windy Point observation area. He was reported to have fallen 150', and was conscious and spitting blood. He fell about 20', hitting his head halfway down, and landing on his feet. The blood was a cola consumed previously. Mt Lemmon Fire people packaged him, we provided a simple haul system, and shortly everyone was back on the highway. 23 people, 68 hours MLFD RMFD

CALL 96.054 SAT 27 JUL: Sabino Canyon was completely dry not long ago. Heavy rain got the stream running again, and it quickly rose to cover the crossings while a tram was in the water. The riders got wet, but the group of all ages were safely on the roadway. Also, a group of hikers was stranded on the upstream side. Heavy rainfall had been recently recorded in Summerhaven, totaling 1.5" in 30 minutes, and we didn't know where else had received heavy rain that could shortly reverse the dropping stream level. Ranger 38 dropped two rescuers to the tram group, and a tram pickup truck was used to ferry people down to a wide spot in the road where the helicopter was able to land. 28 people were airlifted to the maintenance yard helispot. By then, the group of hikers had been assisted across the crossing as the stream level dropped, and the remaining 11 people loaded the vehicles that had made their way up to the group. Meanwhile, a couple of hikers were stranded on the road at the Lower Sabino Crossing. A group of rescuers directed them to walk back towards Bear Canyon, then down the trail to the north end of Bear Canyon Road (Bear Wash was dry!) where a ride was provided back to the Visitors' Center. The two rescue groups remained at their positions, in case any other hikers would try to cross Lower Sabino, not knowing about the alternative exit, and the rides that were available. Not very interesting assignments, but well appreciated!

AMATEUR RADIO CORNER

We have grown from one ham (thanks Joe Barr!) to about half of our membership in about fifteen years. So it seems like it may be time to have a corner in the newsletter for ham stuff. Your ideas are welcome ... what sort of stuff would you like to see here?

ARCA

The Amateur Radio Clubs of Arizona is another group of groups (like SARCI). ARCA provides a forum for groups to find out what each other is doing, provides assistance with problems and with monetary grants. The group also sponsors the yearly ARCA Hamfest held in mid-July at Fort Tuthill just south of Flagstaff, which is well attended for the swapmeet, commercial vendors, meetings (digital, satellite, repeaters, and so on), and just meeting folks including users as well as many of the movers and shakers among the ham community.

A couple of well respected hams (non-SAR) have suggested that "we" could form an informal group and join ARCA, noting the number of hams in our SAR groups, and pointing out that we would then be represented in what's going on among the Arizona ham community. The yearly cost is \$25 per group. We would receive such news and bulletins as ARCA distributes, which could be included in this newsletter. We could designate people to represent us in such ARCA meetings that occur (not required). Such a group might best be organized as part of SARCI, for hams in all of our SAR groups. Your comments and opinions are welcome!

TUCSON HAM GROUPS

Mykle has maintained membership in two local groups. A number of our SAR reportees are hams, and are likely to report problems with the help of people who are members of one or more of the ham groups. My membership has provided opportunities for people to know who we (SAR) are, and about our hams. It also lets people know that we are the ones who respond to requests for SAR help, so that when I talk to the reportee by radio, that the ham that was helping report the problem knows that I'm not just butting in.

The Tucson Repeater Association (TRA) maintains several repeaters in the area, including those on Mt.Bigelow, a couple in Loma's shack on Mt.Lemmon, and the 6.82 repeater at KVOA near Miracle Mile and Drachman with an open phone patch. Membership is recommended for those who use any of the repeaters and want to support the group. The Old Pueblo Radio Club (OPRC) may be the oldest club in Tucson, with a general interest membership. Membership in either group includes a newsletter serving both groups. Mykle can provide more info for those interested in either group.


HAM CLASS


